than a cure for such symptoms, I concluded to carry my own truck, and lead him two or three miles, when meeting with help I remounted, and by oft repeated gentle pats and kind words succeeded in gaining his confidence. Have had no more trouble. and find him good for 40 miles a day without whip or spur.

This letter is already too long, or I would like to tell you what I realize in this levely climate and beautiful valley. I have spent some time in Corvallis, Albany, Salem, and Dayton. In each of these places I found much of pleasant interest, which I can not now relate. I am at present in Oregon City, enjoying the hospitalities of my old friend Robert Pentland, who in company with others own the transit warehouse, situate on the brim of the great Falls of the Willamette. They have a saw mill adjoining, and have at the present time a number of workmen engaged in the erec-tion of a grist mill. I judge this property must be of immense value. Steambouts are almost always in sight, both above and below, and seem to be doing quite an active business. Oregon City is a rough but romantic location. Although it has been somewhat depopulated by the rush to the mines, yet her permanent resources and her people, who know how to make them available, will ultimately secure a pre-eminence in the noble country whose name she bears. There is evidence of taste and refinement in the improvements in progress and the tasteful culture of fruits and flowers, the gardens redolent with roses, and the charming boquets in hands vicing in beauty with those who carried them.

I have paid several visits to the justly renowned Dr. McLoughlin, whose name and history are inseparably connected with those of Oregon His appearance indicates a fine specimen of the venerable and good amongst men. He possesses a large frame, with a face ruddy with health, and a profusion of silken hair and whiskers whitened with age. Ffty-three years he has lived and traded with the Indian tribes, 22 of which he was Superintendent, or he might have been called King in Oregon .-When he first arrived on the site of this city he had but seven men, and was surrounded by 5000 Indians; yet he maintained absolute authority, and during all those years had no general war. I inquired, "How did you prevent difficulties?" He replied, "By the administration of impartial justice. The Indians saw that they were protected as well as punished by law and they learned to respect it. On one occasion a white man committed a rape on an Indian female. I sentenced him to forty stripes in presence of the tribe, which was applied with such severity as to cover him with blood and gore; but if I had not done it two white ladies then coming into the country would have suffered from retaliation for which if I had inflicted punishseent general war would have been the consequence. Indians are tenacious of their rights, and the only way to live in peace is to maintain just laws."

An additional Austrian force is under arms for the Roman States, and the garrisons of Lombardy are to be increased.

LAUNCH OF TAE ADRIATIO .- New York April 7 .- The launching of the steamship Adriatic, for the Collins line, came off this morning, and presented one of the finest sights I ever witnessed. Estimates of the number of persons assembled to witness the launch run as high as seventy thousand, and considering that every available spot, up to the roofs of houses and the topmasts of ships near by, had its occupant, there cannot be much exaggeration in this figure. The Adriatic is not quite so long as the new steamship Persia, of the Cunard line, but in other respects and in capacity she has the advantage, and she may therefore be designated the largest steamship yet affoat. Her extreme length is 355 feet, breadth of beam 50 feet, and depth of hold 88 feet 2 inches. Her capacity, according to custom-house measurement, is about 3,700 tons, but by carpenters' measurement no less than 5,900 tons.

The English papers give the details of a monster blast which was let off a few weeks since at the new harbor-works of the ladies of America, and has demonat Holyhead. It is said it required the labor of six men in its formation for ten months, and a charge of 64 tons of powder to explode it. The quantity of stone loosened by the blast was calculated at sixty thousand tons.

A boy fourteen years of age was recently arrested at Roxwell, England, for stealing an egg-value a half-penny-tried, convicted, and sentenced to four days' hard labor and to be case whipped!

Religious Intolerance in Spain.

Translated for the Evening Post, from the Madrid Correspondence of the Independence Delge.] With regard to the affair of the Protestant Minister whose presence at Barcelona lately caused so much agitation in Spain, M. Arios, Minister of Grace and Justice, has just addressed to the Presidents of all the tribunals throughout the Peninsula a circular, which is worthy of being cited .-M. Arios, noting evidently under clerical influence that has somehow or other been brought to bear upon him, was nevertheless ashamed to publish the document in the Gacetu. I give you the exact text of the paper in question, which is worthy of rank. ng among the circular letters which for-

merly emanated from the Grand Inquistor. "It has come to the knowledge of the Queen, that efforts have been made in certain quarters of the Peninsula to teach and propogate doctrines at variance with the sacred dogmas of our true faith, and contrary to what is professed and taught by the holy Catholic, Apostolic, and Roman Church .-Her Majesty's Government is firmly resolved to display the utmost rigor towards those Spaniards and foreigners who may seek under any pretext whatever to break up or disturb that religious unity to which Divine Providence has willed that Spain should owe her prosperity, and on which reposes (it could not be otherwise) the sacred basis of the Constitution which is to govern the Monarchy. Therefore, Mr. President, you will be pleased to adopt measures in concert with the political, administrative, and ecclesiastical authorities, for preventing, at crime. You will take care to excite the East. zeal of the public functionaries, who are charged with these matters, and who are to proceed officially against any whom they may suspect of harboring designs against the integrity of our religious, basis. It must be understood that, as the piety of the Queen will suitably reward all services med clean. The Government looks upon rendered on such occasions by public officers, in like manner an exemplary punishment will be his who betrays anything like indifference or culpable tolerance.

MERRIMAC .- The warsteamer Merrimac, on her late trial trip from Boston to Norfolk, exercised her shell guns, (200 pounders) of which she carries forty. Shells were fired at two miles range, and nearly all exploded about two feet under water, producing terrible commotion. Three shots out of four, it is estimated by the ordnance officers, would sink any ship at that distance. In order to obviate the local attraction of the iron guns, the compasses of the Merrimac are fitted with the "improvement" of Capt, Morris.
